

Child Safe Standards

New Child Safe Standards were introduced 1 July 2022. Guidance and resources have been developed to support schools transition to the new Standards.

The department's PROTECT website contains guidance to support schools to implement the new Child Safe Standards including a new Child Safe Standards Action List for government schools:

Do the policies have to be approved by school council?	 Child Safety and Wellbeing Policy: NO Child Safety Code of Conduct: YES, school council needs to approve the code of conduct to the extent it applies to school council members, employees, contractor and volunteers Child Safety Risk Register: NO Child Safety Responding and Reporting Obligations Policy and Procedures: NO Action Plan - Aboriginal Learning, Wellbeing and Safety - NO
Recommended consultation	Under the new Child Safe Standards schools must ensure the school community are given the opportunity to have a say in the development and updating of child safety documents. This includes consultation with school council as a community representative body and inviting other members of the community to have a say in the school's child safety and wellbeing policies and practices such as through your school newsletter or website
What is the basis of these policies?	 Ministerial Order 1359 Minimum Standards for school registration
Mandatory review cycles	 The following policies must be reviewed every 2 years: Child Safety and Wellbeing Policy Child Safety Code of Conduct Child Safety Responding and Reporting Obligations Policy and Procedures Action Plan – Aboriginal Learning, Wellbeing and Safety (if your school has this as a separate document) The Child Safety Risk Register must be reviewed every year.

Child safety and wellbeing policies should be publicly available, which generally means placing them on the school's website



- Families and other members of the school community should be given the opportunity to have a say in the school's child safety and wellbeing policies and practices
- Schools can visit the PROTECT website new Child Safe Standards for resources that explain each standard, and further guidance to implement the standards
